

### SitStat Report

#### **SAR Fund Grants**

We are continuing to work on the issue of the Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) expressly reducing the priority for grants for radios on VHF, the band that nearly every SAR team in the West employs. To meet other obligations unrelated to SAR, DOLA announced this past winter that only 800 MHz digital trunked radios, that work on the Colorado state system, will be given high priority. George Epp, executive director of the County Sheriffs of Colorado, is assisting us in our effort to resolve this. We will very closely monitor any efforts that arise that will compromise the effectiveness of the SAR Fund (especially since I read just this morning of a possible legislative restriction placed upon DOLA and its grants, to further "interoperability").

#### **SARCON06!**

Ian Vowles, Mounted Rescue (Pagosa Springs), and his small team of volunteers from SAR teams around Colorado has done a truly remarkable job in planning and preparing for this summer's SARCON06 -- the modern incarnation of the "old" CSRB SAR Conference. The entire event has been revamped, from scheduling and format, to time of year and location, to a new facility.

The great new event features one-half day time blocks for immersion in courses, both classroom and afield. The new site, Western State College in Gunnison, offers a range of lodging and meal options from "SAR-cheap" to "student-decadent."

With six concurrent sessions, all repeated the following day, we offer something for everyone. That doesn't mean the quality is diminished to cover all the bases, because we have top notch faculty for all the tracks:

This means that the scruffy 20-year SAR veterans on your team (that'd be me) can learn something just like the 3-year "newbies." Topics include: Basic SAR, Electronic Tools, Basic Rope Travel, Advanced Technical Skills, Medical, Aircraft and ICS in SAR. We'll also have a superb chance to learn from 2005's several huge, multiple-day missions that required SAR crews from across Colorado, in the Sangre de Cristos, Rocky Mountain National Park and the Snowmass-Maroon Bells Wilderness.

This year we have inaugurated an on-line registration and payment system, nearly eliminating the most difficult tasks for volunteers at past conferences.

#### **Resource typing**

If you have attended any CSRB general meeting in the last few months, you know of the national work continuing to "type" (classify) all manner of emergency response resources. AT the national level it was finally recognized that SAR resources were typed bass-ackwards, resulting in wilderness and other SAR resource types that were undeployable That is what led to Colorado developing the Wilderness Search Crew single resource.

SAR resources are being "retyped" and because of our very successful design of the Wilderness Search Crew single

resource, we have been included in the process, a function of the FEMA/NIMS NIC SAR Credentialing Working group.

The CSRB's Resource Typing Working Group, led by Drew Davis -- a former Interagency Type 1 IMT Group Supervisor in wildland fire -- is using the Wilderness Search Crew single resource as a straw man to build upon. The group has also enlisted ten SAR subject matter experts from across the nation to review its work.

I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at Western State in July!

#### **MRA Honor Guard**

It is close to the time of year when the NASAR annual Conference (May in Austin) and the MRA annual conference (June in San Francisco) are coming.

I typically compile a PowerPoint slide show to music for the opening ceremonies of each for the fallen and their families of SAR-related deaths, as well as known members of SAR related units that have passed from whatever reason.

On March 19<sup>th</sup>, the Montrose County Sheriff's Posse received a call about an overdue party of 3 snowmobiles that were supposedly going up Black Mesa to Bald Mt. in eastern Montrose County and maybe into Gunnison County. The vehicles of the 3 were found at the end of the maintained road on Crystal Creek. The Posse along with West Elk Rescue launched several snowmobile teams, a snowcat, a helicopter and asked CAP for fixed wing support. CAP launched one plane to provide communications and assist with searching. The helicopter located several groups of 3 snowmobiles that closely matched the

description. They landed several times to make contact with them but were all the wrong groups. Finally after about 2 hours of searching, a single person was found trying to climb up a trail in waist deep snow. Contact was made with him and the other 2 subjects were then found trying to follow him out. The 3 had gone down a steep trail into Curecanti Creek drainage. The day before, there had been several inches of new powder snow on top of the 3 feet that was already there. They got stuck and were unable to get back up the hill. They built snow caves and a fire for the night and had some food and water. At daylight,

they started trying to walk back up the hill to walk out when they were found about noon by the helicopter. The 3 were retrieved by snow mobiles from the West Elk team and taken down to their vehicles. Later the next week, they were able to go in via the Curecanti drainage and retrieve their snow mobiles.

## CSRB Meeting Minutes 04 March 2006 Alpine Rescue

Meeting called to order at 1210

#### Resources

Dogs-The 4 corners area was recently contacted regarding dog resources including Sue Purvis of Crested Butte. Looks like there will be some training opportunities coming up. SARDOC currently has 14 air scent, 3 trailing, and 1 water scent dog available.

State Coordinators – down to 7 members. Need a select few to be on it. We discussed the requirements and how to recruit new members.

#### Standards

CRMWG is working on Public Works initiatives trying to put together a private contractor directory of heavy equipment. Working on a national standard for resource tracking and cataloging using a single standard software. Next meeting will be 3/20 @0900—Joint Operations Center. Type 3 working group-stress that mutual aid is done free of charge if an All Hazards IMT is needed. Ops and Situational unit are the most important positions to be filled with discipline specific personnel.

Nat'l Typing-Drew Davis is working w/key persons on the project to change the typing standards put out by Titan. Single resource versus SAR-In-a-Box.

#### **Training**

SARCON—Ian discussed the schedule and explained they "why" of the changes we have made.

MLSO/MLPI—18-19 & 25-26 March in Montrose 17-18 & 24-25 June in Ft. Collins. There will be a class in Aspen in September. They are putting on an MLPI class in Wyoming again. An I-300 will be done in Steamboat F-Sun after Easter weekend. There were some questions and discussion regarding a refresher for PSC. OEM funding is still available for Fire Safety I-100-400. Numerous tracking classes are coming up this year.

#### **MRA**

5 teams are coming up for recert. 2 in April and Crested in November. Some wording is being changed in both the recert and new cert documents.

#### **SAR Fund**

Dawn Alperti is our new rep to the SAR Fund

#### PR/EXT Affairs

A recent find by dogs generated a lot of positive press. The press seems to interested in the results of the SAR Survey. Arapahoe's 50th was in the news.

#### Comms

Frequencies have been re-coordinated. We now have 4 NB VHF and 1 UHF Data/GMRS/packet/APRS. Joe Ben will be checking with New Mexico and is working on the coverage plan. Discussed repeaters and the licensing changes coming up. May have a possible class on comms at next year's SARMA.

#### Other

800 Mhz—Slow work on it. Had the coverage map of the 800 Mhz DTR with the WIN Grant sites. Had a lengthy discussion regarding the issue with DOLA's stand on 800 vs VHF and the cost.

Joe Ben discussed the All Hazard and the DTR system and priorities including possible user fees.

Peelgrane/Holloway—E-mail Howard Paul if you are interested in either committee.

Software—Discussed the proposed software and web solution and how it can help the state coordinators. The coordinators will discuss this within their committee.

#### Missions/Lessons Learned

Larimer—Lengthy Search. Family and church groups got involved. Had to deal with random info given by family. Important that all know not to talk to the family but to know who they are and to keep them involved. Start the planning cycle EARLY!

FRRD—Moving subject causes problems crossing areas already covered.

RMRG—Busiest first 2 months in history. Make sure the investigation is done as soon as possible and to stick with the search plan.

Routt—Planning an new command vehicle and building expansion. Looking for ideas.

CAP—Position reports on sat hits are getting further off due to drift.

Summit—Important to work with the ski areas and the patrol. Get your name and face out over the media. Had 23 slides in one day! Very dangerous conditions. Discussed the changes between morning and afternoon.

#### **Meet ROSS**

ROSS is the **R**esource **O**rdering and Status System, part of the Colorado State Emergency Resource Mobilization Plan (CSERMP). The CSERMP is an all-risk system for the allocation, mobilization, and deployment of resources in the event of a disaster or local incident that requires more resources than those available under any existing interjurisdictional or mutual aid agreement. ROSS is the part of the Plan that lists resources and their availability. The Plan is not a replacement for local response, mutual aid or regional response plans, nor is it a replacement for the national interagency wildland fire plan.

The last item is important. The state ROSS is independent of the federal ROSS used to track wildland fire resources. While the state ROSS tracks both fire and all-risk resources, the federal ROSS only tracks fire resources. The goal is to have a national all-risk ROSS, but that is not going to happen in the near future.

Search and rescue resources need to be placed into the state ROSS because the system will eventually be used for state-wide, and potentially national, mutual aid SAR requests by CSRB coordinators and other agencies. For now, CSRB coordinators are using the traditional means of contacting teams directly. This is one reason why a team needs to keep its contact information up-to-date with CSRB.

How does a SAR organization get into ROSS?

First the organization must deter-

mine what "kinds" and "types" of SAR resources it is or has. Kind is the category, such as wilderness, swiftwater, etc. Type is the capability of the team within each kind. The state is using the kinds and types developed by FEMA as part of the National Incident Management System (NIMS). The FEMA SAR resource typing document is available from the state at the website listed below. An organization needs to be realistic when determining its capabilities.

Once a team or agency determines its SAR capabilities, the data must be entered into ROSS by either the sheriff's department or emergency manager for the county in which the team "works." Some counties have been reluctant to input SAR resources into ROSS, mainly because the SAR agency or organization isn't really part of the county except when requested for a SAR incident. Unfortunately, ROSS was not designed to allow nongovernmental SAR agencies direct input. If your team or organization finds itself in this situation of the county not wanting to input the group, please contact the CSRB representative directly. Also contact CSRB if your organization does not "report" to a particular county and so don't know who to approach about being input.

A SAR organization may have already been input into ROSS without its knowledge. At least one county sheriff's office input "its" SAR team without notifying the team. Finding out this happened by querying ROSS is difficult to do. The ROSS website allows a public search to find what agencies are in the system, but the inputting agency will be listed, not the SAR

group. The best approach is for an organization to determine its capabilities and go to the county with the request to be input. If the county has input the team, check to make sure what was input matches the team's real capabilities. Also, the name of the SAR team or group needs to be listed in the comments section, along with any clarifications to the FEMA typing documents.

ROSS is still an infant suffering growing pains. The best way to discover issues is to exercise ROSS, and the best way to do that is for SAR organizations to ask their county sheriff or emergency manager to be entered into the system. ROSS has the potential for being a useful mutual aid tool, and SAR resources needs to be in it.

#### **Eligibility Requirements**

- 1. Must be a voting NASAR member in good standing
- 2. Must be willing to commit to a three (3) year term of office
- 3. Must be able to travel to meetings and other official organization events

## Recommended Skill Sets for Potential Candidates

Experiences in search and rescue is important. However, there are other factors that should be considered when nominating a member for a role as a

Director of this national corporation:

- 1. Business experience -- Does the member have a background in business, especially not-for-profit work?
- 2. Special skills -- Is the member skilled in Accounting, Law, Negotiation, Fund-

raising, Strategic Planning? These are all critical components of the Board's work.

3. Communications skills -- Is the member at ease speaking to a group about potentially emotional subjects? Can the member adequately convey his or her thoughts both verbally and in writing?

# All Nominations Must Include the Following Information

- 1. Name, address, and member number of nominee
- 2. Clear statement that the nominee has accepted the nomination
- 3. All nominations must be received by the NASAR Nominations Chair by 5pm Central Time May 24, 2006.

## Once Nominated, Candidates Must Provide:

to the Nominations Chair, by close of business June 15, 2006, a JPEG headshot and a 250-word (maximum) biographical statement and candidate statement which includes:

- 1. Educational, work, experiential and volunteer history of nominee
- 2. Description of interest in SAR activities

3. Description of why nominee is interested in a board position and what constituents can expect from nominee if elected

Eligibility of all nominees will be verified before placement on ballot.

Any individual, whether or not directly affiliated with a SAR team, is eligible for this award by having demonstrated their dedication to the Colorado SAR community, or to (a) subject(s) of a SAR mission in any of the following areas:

#### FOR WHAT ACTION

- Personal effort in public preventive safety education.
- Personal effort in professional education of the SAR community.
- Extraordinary efforts in a search or rescue mission, either afield or in mission management.
- Extraordinary efforts in ongoing support of SAR missions during the entire year.
- Personal commitment to the professional advancement of Colorado's SAR community.

#### **DEADLINE**

Nominations will be accepted from any member of the CSRB (individual) or CSRB member organization (teams, other organizations), or any Colorado county sheriff. Nominations are due to the CSRB by May 1st. The award will be presented at the Annual CSRB SAR Conference in July.

#### HOW TO NOMINATE

Nominations should include, at the minimum:

- Name, address, organizational affiliation and telephone number(s) of the nominee
- Name, address, organizational affiliation and telephone number(s) of the nominator.
- Complete SAR biographical profile of the nominee
- Relevant personal biographical information
- Complete details of the events, or ongoing service, for which the nominee has been chosen.

The greater the detail of the above information, the easier it will be to evaluate the appropriateness of making such an award.

An updated version of the SHIFT POA Calculator (version 4.0) is now available on the AMRG website at: http://www.amrg.org/sar\_links.html

A description of this search management tool is provide on this page as well.

Updates/fixes in the new version include:

- a) revised Initial POA worksheet--now using proportional consensus method with an easy to use scale (A-H) that enters proportional values automatically and then calculates initial POAs.
- b) Probability density worksheet--for tracking Pden if region/segment parameters are known.
- c) Two POD estimation worksheets for determining POD during debrief and tracking PODs by team and segment throughout mission:
  - 1. POD factoring worksheet

(www.PODfactoring.org)

- 2. POD Calc worksheet (Frost, J.F. IAMSAR) with associated POD vs. Coverage Graph and table worksheets
- d) fixed cell formulas so that #Div/0! and #Value! error messages are not displayed when no data exists in worksheets.
- e) updated list of references

As usual, please let me know if you have any problems downloading the file or if you find any errors or problems with the worksheets.

Also, I'd appreciate any feedback you might have on its application and whether you have used it successfully during an actual mission.
